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Heightening Health Care in Grenada



St. George's University graduate Randy Becker and many other physicians have contributed their time and expertise to the Grenada health care system.

Now in its ninth year, 12° North, formerly the Virtual Hospital Program, has invited visiting health care professionals to offer up their time and expertise, working alongside and assisting the resident staff of the General Hospital in Grenada and expanding the range of available health care to Grenadians at no cost.

For 2015, the SGU program continued its strong collaborations with the Ministry of Health (MOH) and hospitals in Grenada, focusing on the regional/global concern of diabetes and hypertension, including the risks of cardiovascular disease, ophthalmology disease, chronic wounds and amputations that follow. In this regard, the physician program has structured many of its clinical programs around the treatment, education, and general support in these key areas, in order to reduce some of the burden on Grenada's public system.

Particularly noteworthy this year was the new 12° NORTH, continued on page 4

\$1.8M in CityDoctors Scholarships Awarded

In January, NYC Health + Hospitals President Dr. Ram Raju announced 17 students who, under the CityDoctors scholarship program, will receive scholarships totaling \$1.8 million to attend SGU. In return, the students have committed to give back to their communities by practicing primary care medicine in NYC's public health system after completing their medical educations.

CityDoctors was launched in 2012 to help address the shortage of primary care physicians and to increase educational and career opportunities for local youth. The scholarship recipients are selected based on their academic excellence and financial need, and will receive either partial or full scholarships to pay for medical school tuition for up to four years, with some scholarships valued at more than

\$200,000 each.

To date, the program has helped 82 students from in and around NYC attend medical school on the equivalent of 38 full scholarships, and, in return, 152 years of needed primary care services have been committed to NYC's health care system. In total, more than \$11 million in medical school scholarships are expected to be awarded under CityDoctors.

To be eligible for a CityDoctors scholarship, students must fulfill all the requirements to be accepted to medical school and also meet at least one of the following criteria: graduated from a NYC high school; have five years of residency in NYC; have a parent employed by NYC Health + Hospitals or the City of New York; or be employed themselves by NYC Health + Hospitals or the City of New York for at least five years.

12° North Program Delivers Quality Health Care

12° NORTH, continued from page 1 collaboration with the LIG Global Foundation—a philanthropic team of physicians and an affiliate of the program—to develop a wound care and limb preservation center of excellence. Its aim is to work with the community health centers to reduce Grenada's rate of amputations and improve the quality of life of those afflicted by chronic ulcers and wounds. This new collaboration led to an increase in the wound care clinic schedule from having two clinics a year to almost monthly clinics being provided, at an estimated value of \$30,000USD (\$41,600EC).

Additionally, SGU has commenced the Medical Doctors Volunteer Program, in which doctors in academic positions are able to volunteer to do weekend and extra hours at the nation's hospital. This initiative has provided much needed support to clinicians at both hospitals. So far, approximately 25 SGU physicians have paid to be registered to be eligible to volunteer with further support expected in 2016.

Through 12° North, visiting specialists have also donated more than half a million US dollars worth of pharmaceuticals, supplies, and equipment. Dr. Mark Lanzieri and his team worked with the MOH to ensure the acquisition of the aforementioned cath lab to the general hospital came to fruition, performing angiography and Grenada's first stent at the hospital. The addition is valued at more than \$300,000USD and will reduce the financial burden to the people of Grenada and the Ministry of Health.

Similarly, Dr. Randy Becker, MD SGU '00 and his team have provided radiology support and training in sonography and radiography for hospital technicians. Valued at approximately \$10,000USD, they have garnered donations in excess of \$30,000USD. Dr. Becker and his team have pledged to set up the Picture and Archiving Systems to electronically connect the General Hospital with Princess Alice Hospital, facilitating the transmission and receipt of radiology, valued at approximately \$200,000.00EC.
